KEY FACTS

Therapeutic Intervention Expertise

Master's level mental health professionals provide essential daily support to students as a key component of successful educational performance including:

- Cognitive behavioral methods that focus on creative problem solving, self-regulation, perspective taking and developing relationships with others.
- Individual and group therapy sessions.

Individualized Academic Planning

- Outcome-driven online curriculum is supported by an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) for each student.
- Student classes based on grade level, cognitive level and graduation requirements.
- Individualized electives available based on student interests.

Transition Services and Vocational Skill Development

- Opportunities to practice social and functional skills as students gain real world experience walking to parks and frequenting local retail establishments in a safe small suburban location.
- Students ages 14 through 21 in groups of 1-3 accompanied by a Community Based Instruction Specialist to learn vocational skills at participating local businesses.
