A History of the United States at the Olympics

In April 1896, with little notice, a group of United States' athletes set sail for Athens, Greece. They were traveling to compete in the Summer Olympic Games. It was the first international Olympic Games of the modern era. It was also the beginning of the United States' participation in the Olympics.

Fourteen young men from the United States participated in the first modern Olympic Games in 1896. The majority of the athletes were from the East Coast. They came from Princeton University, Harvard University, and the Boston Athletic Association.

The United States Olympic team has grown immensely since its humble beginnings in 1896. The team now surpasses 550 athletes.

The United States hosted its first Summer Olympics in 1904, in St Louis, Missouri. Since then, it has gone on to host seven more Olympics, three summer and four winter. This record of hosting the Olympics is more than any other nation, with France next in line with five games hosted.

The United States is one of three countries that do not pay for their athletes to attend the Olympics. Rather the American Olympic athletes are dependent upon sponsors to earn enough money to cover the cost of participating in the Olympic Games.

Great Seal of the United States

The picture below shows the Great Seal of the United States of America.

It pictures a bald eagle with an olive branch in its right talon and arrows in its left talon. The olive branch is a symbol of peace. It shows that our country always wants to be peaceful. The arrows are a symbol of war. They show that our country is willing to fight to protect our freedom if we need to.

There are 13 leaves on the olive branch and 13 arrows. There are also 13 stars above the eagle and 13 stripes on the crest. The number 13 represents the number of states our country had when it began.

"E pluribus unum" is a Latin phrase. It means "Out of many, one." This phrase shows that many states work together to form one strong country.
