

Social Interaction: Using the Environment

Manipulating the environment to increase interactions between students can be a simple and successful strategy. The following pictures demonstrate how to arrange materials for activities that can change from being solitary to being interactive.




Using LEGO® blocks give each student a different color of blocks and a picture of a design to construct. The design incorporates more than one color.



This visual cue prompts a student To say, "Please pass, (color) block"



The student who gives a block has a visual cue to prompt: "Do you want a big one or a small one?"



This is the finished product after students have interacted to build their own.

This environmental set-up can be used with endless materials for activities. The key is organizing, providing needed supports, and manipulating the materials.
